



\$1.8M for Train Injuries

Sharpe v. New Jersey Transit Rail Corp.: A Hudson County jury awarded \$1.6 million on June 21 to a train passenger who claimed he suffered spinal injuries in a crash in Secaucus.

Michael Sharpe, now 57, of Billerica, Mass., grossly aggravated a prior spinal condition, cervical stenosis, when his New York-bound New Jersey Transit train from Trenton derailed on July 14, 2003, according to the suit filed by Bruce Nagel and Adam Slater of

NJ Transit said at the time that a wheel malfunction caused the wreck and that 25 passengers sought treatment for minor injuries.

Sharpe was an executive in a shoe manufacturing company but post-traumatic stress and the injuries, which required surgery, forced him to take a lower-paying sales job with fewer responsibilities, according to the plaintiff's evidence. The defense stipulated to liability.

After a seven-day trial before Judge Barry Sarkisian, the jury awarded \$1.2 million for pain and suffering, \$400,000 for past and future lost wages and \$4,635 for medical bills, Slater says.

The defense lawyer, Deputy Attorney General Paul Nieves, was not available for comment last week. Leland Moore, a spokesman for the attorney general, confirms the amount of the verdict. Moore says the defense evidence showed that the accident slightly aggravated a pre-existing condition.
